

Redefining Success Harnessing the Power of Soft Skills



A DEBT TRAP IMPACT ON MACROECONOMIC AND FINANCIAL STABILITY

"Debt is the sum of money that is owed by one party that is paid in future with a benchmark interest". The fact that debt has a role in economic and financial stabilization but it also has potential consequence over macroeconomic and financial stabilities. Historically four broadbased debt waves employed wide ranges upshots spanning from 1970s to 2009 are the solid consequences of "World Depression" of 1930s. The subpar interest rate that optimistically ensure investors to sell securities in financial markets and investment in bond market surged. Accumulation of huge funds on a subpar benchmark by the investors and an expediting financial transactions by the financial managers needed in depth watchdog. A strong stump of financial crises compelled financial markets to coincide with unparalleled global downturns resulting in increasing investor risk aversion, risk premium and borrowing cost followed by downswing capital inflows. Financial crises uproar due to massive borrowings that are usually followed by reforms conceived to lower vulnerabilities and consolidate policy frameworks. The debt waves culminated in

EMDE's (Emerging Market & Developing Economies) balance of payment irregularities, unstable exchange rates, weak fiscal policies and financial sector supervision is a real life example.





There is a famous saying in economics "There is no free lunch". Debt is a no free lunch means that debt does not invariably resultin favorable fruits. Financial crises hint out how world has gone through massive debt trap and the world has seen downswings in protracted production loss, sudden pause in employment, floatable exchange rates

cumulated in outflows from vulnerable economies to lender economies leading to greater economic inequalities between advance and poor economies. Statistical research tools are used to check the impacts of debt on macroeconomic and financial durability. Since 1970 EMDEs has seen national episodes of rapid debt accumulation by the lender economies that resulted in more capital absorption from emerging economies that in turn resulted in financial crises. Countries registered high debts faced severe output distress, especially by the government sectors, and accumulated greater macroeconomic and financial vulnerabilities than non-crises countries. The crises are triggered by external shocks such as sinking interest rate. There is no such magic of a policy prescription to ensure the success of debt. Past debt waves episode isodes show critical role of policies in determining outcomes of those waves. To alleviate the impact of the debt waves ending into crises, robust macroeconomic and financial policies by the monetary and fiscal authorities, sound business environment and financial institutions through debt management and transparency, mobilizing domestic saving and to divert the funding towards purpose that raise export proceeds, productivity or potential outputs are required immediately. Apart from the public finance management, policies that promote good aovernance can ensure that debt is used for productive goals.

Exploring the Dynamics of Family Business: Muddasir Riaz Khan's Groundbreaking Research in Strategic Financial Management

Muddasir Riaz Khan is a Doctoral Student of Management Sciences department. He specializes in Finance and particularly Strategic Financial Management. With a BBA degree and a gold medal from Government College of Management Sciences. Muddasir bachelor's project focused on financial statement analysis of the National Bank of Pakistan. He completed his MS from COMSATS Abbottabad, title of his MS research was 'Founding Family Ownership in Pakistan: Empirical Investigation of Firm Performance'. In addition to that he has also carried out a socio-economic survey in Hazara division under the name of 'Socio Economic Effects of Inflation on the Poor and Low-Income People Living in Hazara Division of Pakistan'

Currently pursuing his Ph.D. in Finance at COMSATS. His subject area is Strategic Financial Management and Family Business System. In his thesis he examines the financial strategy and performance of family businesses, with the title of 'FamilyBusiness System: Financial Strategy and Performance'. Muddasir has a peculiar focus and interest in research related to Family Businesses.



His work is among the pioneer effects in the context of Pakistan and overall Family Business discipline. Family Business discipline is currently struggling with the issue of Internal Heterogeneity and his work is related to building a typology of difference among family businesses, and this has the potential to address internal heterogeneity debate of Family Business discipline. Mudassir has recently published a research paper 'An Investigation of Family Entrepreneurship in Ownership and Firm Performance: Empirical Evidence from Pakistan' in 2022. Muddasir started his research PhD research project under the supervision of Prof. Dr. Syed Amjad Farid Hasnu, and after retirement Ast. Professor Dr Yasir Bin Tariq is supervising him and is looking forward to complete this Ph.D.journey along with him.

The major goal of the department is to maximize its revenue generation by collecting timely bill payments from itscustomers.

I worked on their billing software known as BNCC, a database of customers who were utilizing PTCL services. Similarly, other responsibilities as an intern included studying the operational system

flow thoroughly, creating and analyzing reports, conducting analytical and trend analysis on the billing report thorough monitoring of net payments, arrears, net payables, etc., computing the receivables default ratio to identify a trend, percentage analysis carried out for comparison of all 18 regions of PTCL across Pakistan, Customer behavior analysis and much more.

Finally, I carried out some significant financial analysis on PTCL to incorporate in my project which proved fruitful for the overall report. The project concluded with a viva conducted by an external examiner, which Alhamdulillah was an amazing experience for me.

THE TALE OF TWO IDEOLOGIES

Western countries like England, France, Italy, Germany, Austria, Holland and USA constituted the North in the early 19th century, the remaining imperialist powers like the Ottomans or the Portuguese were not influential to the extent that they shaped or had a drastic impact on the global politics. The Western states or the global North had imperialistic designs and capitalism was the way of life and economy. By capitalism it is meant Free market economy, liberal policies, class struggle and imperialistic designs.

On the other hand, there was Russia and China, which had redundant amount of resources but they didn't have the means to develop their markets and there was monarchy in those states, they also were isolationist and had the beliefs that there existed no world beyond them and whatever existed was lesser than them. Also, the global South, that is the African states, Eastern European states, South east Asian states, South American states and the Indian subcontinent, the global south was under the direct command of the rich and powerful capitalist states which were subjugating them through imperialistic policies. Colonialism was the basic enigma of the time. The countries in close vicinity with Russia and China were the Subcontinent region and south east Asian states which were under the control of imperialist powers. So the strategic context made up by the global politics was such that Russia and China had a fear of the Western states against colonialism and they didn't want to be subjugated.

It is asserted that the strategic context and culture, geography and historical fostering of a state determines its adherence to a thought, philosophy, religion and ideology. Russia and China had a great amount of raw materials, they had to escape the neo colonialist ventures of the West that is extracting the raw materials and selling the manufacturing goods to the they started manufacturing things themselves, opened their own markets, brought Communism and achieved their primary goal of not being subjugated by the capitalistic colonial hawks. Communism therefore came to Russia and China, because the strategic culture and context demanded it because Russia and China were not subjugated, and because there was no strict control of the capitalists in the region. Had Russia been subjected to colonialist policies like the Subcontinent, there would never have been communism because the capitalists, wherever they went, created a system which promulgated moral and intellectual corruption and a system where the desires of people were so great that they would forget the concept of common good. However, there is another debate that the essence of Marxism wasn't fulfilled and that both Russia and China had introduced their own versions of Communism which were divergent from the original Marxist text.

The capitalists were able to win the war of ideologies or the battle for hegemony because they were better equipped in strategic, economic, technological and military terms. The same technological advancements were carried out by the Russians but they were always one step behind.

If, the Russians had been successful in promulgating their will and idea of dominating the world and making communism the way of global life, they would have certainly become the exploiters, this thought can be ascertained by their presence in Eastern Europe and their satellite states which were although a part of Soviet Union but were constantly being exploited and all the surplus and capital went to what is presently known as Russia. Similarly, if China becomes the global hegemon, which means that it had a desire to dominate and to be invincible and that it was successful in making that desire come true, it would become the exploiter, irrespective of what it believes. The classical realist thought of the power struggle is applicable here, which is if a state becomes powerful, it has to maintain its power by gaining more power and this dilemma can only be halted when it becomes the hegemon.





It can also be asserted then, given this dialogue, that during contemporary times if a state becomes dominant, it has to introduce open markets, free trade economies, promulgate wars, maintain peace, it can be therefore labelled as a capitalist state. Therefore if a communist state becomes the global Hegemon, it will seek out capitalistic ventures and become capitalist.

It can be said that Ideologies are mere elusions, tools, used by the rulers to get popular acceptance from their people, to come to power and to stir popular uprisings. These ideologies are broadened, widened and made part of every body's thought by historians and intellectuals whose job is to describe the events that take place and give explanations as to what has happened.
